

Editorial

I Need to Win the Lotto in 12 years

Given the guidelines in determining my nest-egg, I need to have about 8 million in 12 years. Using an interest rate higher than a savings account rate, I have to set aside about 162,000 pesos in savings every three months, or roughly 54,000 pesos a month. Upon learning this I broke out in sweat, trying to absorb the enormity of the task: how could I possibly do it? The only answer would be to win the lotto, hence the title of my paper. But I panic in advance.

In the beginning of the Financial Management course, I learned that more than 50% of employees, particularly managers, do not have any savings; they live from paycheck to paycheck, spending what they have earned over the past 15 working days, reaching zero balance just in time for the next pay day. An even higher percentage does not have a retirement plan; they have neither any investments nor a back-up business that they could go to should they lose their jobs or retire.

I have to admit, I belong to this population. I do not have any savings; I live from one paycheck to the next. The idea of retirement loom ahead and sometimes, I do think about it, but work and other more urgent matters take over my attention, and more often than not, the idea simply gets pushed at the back of the mind

It was, therefore, perhaps fate's way of forcing me to think and plan for my retirement, because our final paper asks us to write about our personal financial goals.

The first step was to determine my desired monthly income in today's peso rate. I have to admit that I needed to temper myself in this exercise by removing expenses that are not among the bare minimum, yet would allow me to live comfortably. A big chunk, or 34%, went to food and groceries, and next goes to house help (I figured I would need help around the house when I get old). Mobility needs come next to keep a car, fuel it and maintain it. I allotted some budget for medicines, communication needs (telephone, internet), and of course utilities like electricity and water. And yes, some budget for my beloved cats. In total, I would need about 35,500 pesos every month.

Rounded off to 36,000 pesos, I then assumed a 12,000 monthly SSS pension and deducted that from the total monthly expenses, and the result is that I am short by about 24,000 pesos. Multiply that by 12 months and with an annualized 8% return, I came up with the amount of 3.6 million pesos as my "nest egg", or the amount I would need to come up for my retirement fund. Assuming a 20% tax, the amount goes up to 4.32 million; and with 7% inflation rate factored in, I have the astronomical figure of 9.73 million. Assuming that I will work with my present employer till I turn 60 and thus receive a retirement fund which I could deduct from the amount, I still have quite an intimidating figure of almost 8 million pesos. I need to have 8 million pesos in 12 years.

And so we go back to my first paragraph. Going to the future and back, I now face the reality that I need to save about 54,000 pesos a month to arrive at my nest egg figure, and this is simply not possible. In my present situation, I could probably save only about 12,000 pesos a month; or still about 42,000 pesos short. The panic continues.

I know I need to assure what is left of my future; and with my current resources I can make modest investments in government bonds to boost my savings, and equally modest investments in a few blue chip stocks, that would stay as investments way beyond into my retirement years, as a form of savings that would give me a bigger gain than a simple savings account. However, at this point, I believe that the most feasible plan for me is to come up with a sustainable source of income that would continue even after my retirement year.

The most obvious solution is to start a business now while I am still earning, which, hopefully, will have taken off from being in the red and into earning profit by the time I retire. Asking advice from family and friends, I realized that this is an even bigger risk than investing in the risky-with-high-return stocks, because in effect, I will be "putting my eggs into one bas-



ket" – the business. Yet, I think it is a more feasible plan; and I must admit, a more attractive plan for me, because it will also keep me busy, useful, and connected with the rest of the community.

I have to thank the course for prying my eyes open to the future, and I actually feel a bit excited about Project: The Future.

When you visit a school for AIDS orphans and meet the kids who are being cared for, educated, and taught a trade — and when you know, as you look into their faces, that if it weren't for our Foundation, they would be sleeping on the street, eating out of the trash — you don't ever see our Foundation in the same way again.

We are in the middle of one of the most exciting years we have ever known for our Rotary Foundation. We've just rolled out a new grant model, one that will challenge and inspire us all to think bigger and to develop more ambitious projects that will have a more lasting impact. We've accepted a new challenge from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, which has committed to match, two to one, every Rotarian dollar contributed to polio eradication for the next five years, up to US\$35 million per year. And we are now fighting the final battles in our war against polio — a war we are absolutely committed to win.

Our Foundation's goal always has been Doing Good in the World. With our new grant model, we aren't going to be satisfied with simply doing good. We will do the most good we can, in the most lasting ways possible – for the people who need us the most.

For your Information

Granny's Old-Fashioned Bread Pudding with Vanilla Sauce

- 4 cups (8 slices) cubed white bread
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 2 cups milk
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 tablespoon vanilla
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg

Sauce Ingredients:

- 1/2 cup butter
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup heavy whipping cream
- 1 tablespoon vanilla

Directions for Pudding:

Heat oven to 350°F. Combine bread and raisins in large bowl. Combine milk and 1/4 cup butter in 1-quart saucepan. Cook over medium heat until butter is melted (4 to 7 minutes). Pour milk mixture over bread; let stand 10 minutes.

Stir in all remaining pudding ingredients. Pour into greased 1 1/2-quart casserole. Bake for 40 to 50 minutes or until set in center. Directions for Sauce:

Combine all sauce ingredients except vanilla in 1-quart saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring occasionally, until mixture thickens and comes to a full boil (5 to 8 minutes). Stir in vanilla.

To serve, spoon warm pudding into individual dessert dishes; serve with sauce. Store refrigerated -Fashioned Bread Pudding with Vanilla Sauce

Minutes of the Meeting

Regular Meeting RC Sta. Rosa Centro

25 October 2013, Friday El Cielito Inn

The meeting started at 7:40 p.m. Attendees were: President Doray, IPP Liza, PP Che, PP Jackie, PN Pen, Rtn. Myrna, Rtn Glo

1. Committee reports:

- a). Bloodletting project held last October 18 at Isuzu Phils. Corp. by PP Che:
 - 'Bloodletting attendees were: Pres Doray, PE Mayor Arlene, Chairman Che, IPP Liza, PP Jackie, PP Carol, Rtn Myrna, Rtn Cecile, Rtn Glo, Rtn Jenny, Rtn Sheila.
 - Out of 96 registrants, 86 successfully donated.
 - ·Some were not able to donate because the PNRC cut the bloodletting by 3 pm; they need to transport the blood already to prevent spoilage.
 - 'Chairman Che thanked everyone for their support and commented that the bloodletting was a big success.
 - 'Next time we will tap Isuzu Autoparts or other companies in Laguna Technopark.
 - 'Concerns: Mayor Arlene instructed us to give mugs to all registrants, but they were given only to those who donated. We will just check the list and Rtn Myrna can hand over the mugs.
 - 'It was also noted that one day may not be enough to accommodate more than 100 donors; either we hold the bloodletting for 2 days or increase the number of doctors and beds.
 - From our fund of 9000 pesos, our expenses were 7022 for the food and 1000 for tarpaulin, so we have a balance of 978 pesos to be put back to our club funds.
- b). Vocational Tour by IPP Liza
 - ·35 students joined the tour together with Dir. Evs, Pres. Doray and IPP Liza.
 - 'We only brought them to Malayan because we lacked time to coordinate with other companies. The tour was finished by 1 pm and the students felt it was too short.

'Overall, however it was good. Malayan provided snacks, PP Maan provided the transpo and 1000 pesos for lunch, fuel c/o Rotarians.

•For our Vocational Tour Part II, I spoke with the adviser and he was not in favour of our plan to bring the students to Intramuros and Coast

Guard, because it is not aligned with their school's focus on Science and Technology. It was agreed that we will change our plans for Part II and explore other options. Some suggested destinations are PAG-ASA, Philyolcs and ABS-CBN.

- c). TRF by IPP Liza
 - 'Gov. Ona sent us a letter reminding us of our pledges.
 - Deadline is supposed to be Oct. 25 but most likely it could be extended. If we can do EREY, maybe it could be recognized on Nov. 21 recognition night.
 - 'So far, those who already gave: Rtn Glo (\$500), PP Che (\$50), PP Jackie (\$100), Rtn Myrna (\$100).
 - 'IPP Liza will text everyone to remind them.
- d). Deworming held October 8 at Dita Elementary School by Rtn Glo Attendees were: Pres Doray, PE Mayor Arlene, PP Che, PP Jackie, Rtn Glo.
 - 'More than 300 pupils were given the tablets, with only 1 case of vomiting.
 - 'Mayor Arlene attended and stayed for about an hour. She read a story to the pupils about hand washing, enacted by PP Jackie (as water), Pres. Doray (as the hands) and PP Che (as soap). Afterwards she gave away candies to the children.
 - •Pres. Doray served pansit and puto after the deworming, helped by Spouse Danny and Mayor's bodyquards.
 - •PN Pen was reminded to provide photos of the Deworming project she held at their subdivision for documentation.
- e). Hospital Beds donation by PN Pen
 - 'I was assigned to look for possible recipients of our 2 hospital beds. I know of an indigent who is a part of our rescue team, her husband had a stroke and could use the hospital bed.
 - 'Pres. Doray was asked if there are restrictions in granting the bed for personal use and she said there are none. However, PP Jackie said that the bed may be used by the sick indigent only, and must be returned in the event the bed cannot be used anymore (recovery or death).

'Pres. Doray said she will ask Dra. Cunanan about the planned transfer of the birthing clinic to another location, in which case they might need a hospital hed.

7. President's Time:

- a). Pres Doray thanked all who participated in our bloodletting, which was a "blockbuster", as well as the participants of our vocational tour.
- b). We brought our RYLA participants this morning. For their registration of 1,300 pesos each, we gave them 5K pesos, the balance will be divided among them. I also PAID 1000 pesos for the 2 tents we rented and rented a van for them. They will return this Sunday.
- c). Our Halloween party, supposed to be tonight, has been cancelled because we have less than 20 attendees, therefore the fee cannot cover the rental for Esmeralda. Mother Club offered to change the venue to Pres Eric's place near AUP, but we still cannot cover the expenses with the attendees so we decided to cancel it.
 - 'PP Jackie said that Mother Club has decided to push through with it on it by themselves.
- d). During the Gawad Parangal, our candidate Dra. Salundanes was inducted as our member. This was unexpected and even Mother Club was surprised. It was agreed that the club should make sure that she will be a member for real by attending meetings and activities.

8. Other Matters

- a). PP Liza: Per PP Leni, we have to come up with a project with our sister club RC Wodonga. Since our club's thrust is maternal and child health, bow about another birthing clinic?
 - •PP Che commented that our existing birthing clinic is now 24 hours.
 - 'Another option we can explore is Adopt a Daycare. Brgy Pagoyo was supposed to be given a grant by GK but was moved repeatedly. We already have a container van, but no area for it to be located yet.

'We can explore companies who donate schoolbuildings, have a tie up with them and we can provide the furnitures and fixtures.

- b). For our Matching grant projects, best options are Cervical Cancer Vaccine and PAP Smear. PP Che will ask CHO for details.
- c). Rtn Myrna is suggesting to have a video showing on Environmental Effect of plastics. It will be brought up to Dir. Evs.
- d). Rtn Myrna relayed Gov. Chit's message that she would like to hold a short photography seminar for us, so that we will know how to take action photos, etc. We can hold it during a regular meeting.
- e). PP Che raised concern about our attendance report; swap days are not being counted. Example, she was absent on Oct. 8 but she was present during the Oct. 4 Deworming project. Same with Rtn Glo. PP Jackie said that swap days should be +/- 14 days from the regular meeting date to qualify for swapping.
- f). PP Che announced that per the DGN, we can already choose a district event that we could host, so we should discuss that already. Mayor Arlene was already given the DTAC to be hosted by our club next year.
- 5. The meeting was adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

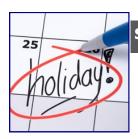
