





 Membership Matters

Rotary Year 2014-2015 heralds the year to "Light Up Rotary", with focus on Membership. This cannot be stressed enough and has been repeatedly discussed by speakers during district conferences, who are all saying that we, as Rotarians, should make it our personal advocacy to improve our club's membership numbers.

While the lectures dwelt on the importance of increasing and retaining membership, very little was discussed on "how-to" to do it. But thanks to the Rotary International website, particularly the discussion forum, we can consider these ideas:

Attract young members. This idea has its merits and demerits. Some argued that it is so difficult to recruit the younger set because (1) they are not yet financially stable and (2) they are still busy raising their families and building careers. On the other hand, it is a known fact that a good number of RI presidents who started out at a very young age, proving that the younger set is a good source of quality Rotarians. We can see that the objective of "attracting

young members" is probably incomplete; what we are looking to attract are the natural leaders who exhibit strong leadership tendencies at a young age. It could only be an exercise in futility when we try to recruit the younger set just because we want to have younger members.

Recruit potential Rotarians. When we say "potential Rotarians", we refer to those who are "most likely join"; in Sales and Marketing parlance, the "market" of Rotary. These are the people who, knowingly or unknowingly, need or want what Rotary has to offer. Looking at the profile of Rotarians, the average age is anywhere from



late 50's to early 60's. One of the reasons is because this is the age when a person has reached his maturity stage. In Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs, we can see that Rotary answers the needs at the topmost level of the pyramid i.e. the self-actualization stage, and these needs are often attained during a person's advanced age.

So why insist on attracting young members who do not belong to our "market"? There is a huge pool of potential Rotarians aged 45 and above who are still able-bodied, willing and raring to serve!

Engage new members. The whole idea of Rotary is service above self; ergo, engagement in service projects is not only needed, it is expected. It is when expectations are not met that we experience attrition of members; therefore it is crucial that our clubs deliver this requirement. Service projects are the meat of a Rotary club's survival; without it, it will just be another group of people meeting once a week.

With meaningful and active service projects, existing members should see to it that all members are engaged. This will ensure fulfillment of the ideals of Rotary, and having a Rotarian for life.

Dynamic Young Club Uses Social Media To Grow



Erin Mills had just finished teaching for the day in Montevideo, Uruguay, when her smartphone buzzed with a message.

An impromptu gathering to watch Uruguay's World Cup soccer match was being organized. Through the power of a mobile messaging app, a majority of the Rotary Club of Plaza Matriz had soon assembled at a member's home to munch on baked goods and chips while rooting for their national team.

That enthusiasm and ability to draw a crowd has made the club, which just received its charter in July, a success in the country's capital city. Made up almost entirely of young professionals, it is the kind of club Rotary is eager to have more of. It has also served as a bridge back to Rotary for former members of Rotaract, who must leave the program when they turn 30.

Mills says she could tell the club had something special by its third meeting. "It turned into a brainstorming session of all the projects we wanted to do. No idea was too large or too small."

HOW THE CLUB GOT STARTED

- For Mills, the club has also offered a way to get reestablished in Uruguay. She came to Montevideo in 2008 on a scholarship sponsored by the Rotary Club of Casa Grande, Arizona, USA, and joined the Rotaract Club of Paso Molino.
- After completing her scholarship, she returned to Arizona and began a long-distance relationship with one of the Rotaractors she had met during her studies. Realizing that her heart was in Uruguay in more ways than one, she completed an advanced degree in bilingual education and returned. She is now teaching future English language educators at the University of Montevideo and middle school students from around the world at an American International School.
- Finding a new group to connect with wasn't initially easy. She looked for a Rotary club to join but couldn't find one that "had the right vibe." They either were too far from her home or didn't offer the sense of family she was searching for as an expatriate.

Many of her friends had left the Paso Molino Rotaract Club.

- About the same time, Nicolas Ortiz, a member of the Rotary Club of Montevideo and chair of the district's New Generations committee, began running into many of Mills' old friends. He realized that all of these former Rotaractors and the former Rotary Scholar would be the ideal core for a new club, so he encouraged them to start one.
- "We were all a little intimidated by the responsibility. Where do you even start? And then there's the financial responsibility involved," Mills recalls. "But he helped us and got his club to sponsor many of our costs, and his club eventually became our sponsor club."
- From there, district leaders took the group under their wing. Past District Governor Antonio Nocetti Ruiz got other district officers together to advise them on the steps they needed to take to found the club and even attended many of the unofficial planning meetings.

"We're excited to bring Rotary into the next generation," says Mills.

Rotary Historic Moments

During the first Rotary club meeting on 23 February 1905 in Chicago, Paul Harris, Gustavus

Loehr, Hiram Shorey, and Silvester Schiele met to talk about their personal experiences. Harris then unfolded his general plan for their club meetings. This was the simple beginning of the world's first service club, the Rotary Club of Chicago. It was created because of Harris' wish to capture in a professional club the same friendly spirit he had felt in the small towns of his youth. The Rotary name derived from the early practice of rotating meetings among members' offices. Rotarians continue to take pride in their history.

In honor of that first club, Rotarians have preserved its original meeting place, Room 711 in Chicago's Unity Building, by recreating the office as it existed in 1905. For several years, the Paul Harris 711 Club maintained the room as a shrine for visiting Rotarians.

In 1989, when the building was scheduled to be demolished, the club carefully dismantled the office and salvaged the interior, including doors and radiators. In 1993, the RI Board of Directors set aside a permanent home for the restored Room 711 at RI World Headquarters in the Chicago suburb of Evanston.


