



How a Simple School Project In India Became A Global Grant



Two years ago, U.S. Rotary members in Maine set out to improve the education system in Bikaner, Rajasthan, an Indian city near the border of Pakistan. The Rotary Club of Kennebunk Portside chose Bikaner because club member Rohit Mehta was originally from the area and had connections there. Mehta put the club in contact with Rotarians in India to provide desks for four government-run schools.

But when community leaders returned with a request for more desks, the Maine Rotarians decided they had to think bigger. The Rotary Foundation had rolled out its new grant model, which required that the club do more than just purchase school furniture to qualify for global grant funding. Club leaders put their heads together and turned a simple project to provide school desks into a global grant project by adding a campaign to recruit new students and professional development for teachers.

"Because the new grant standards required further thought, a superior grant emerged," notes Peter Johnson, Rotary Foundation chair for District 7780, which covers Maine. "Additional questions were asked, which boil down to, 'OK, they need benches [desks] and you want to help them get their benches, but what's going to happen with these benches?' The standards dramatically improved the project's scope, tone, and tenor."

The Rotary clubs worked with School Management Committees — teams of school administrators, community leaders, and Bikaner Rotary members — to determine what each school needed most. They discovered that the children were unschooled and had never sat in a classroom before. So the committees decided it would be easier to get the students to commit to a three-day-a-week lesson plan. That left the other two days for the same benches to be used for teacher training.

"The teachers at the government schools are well qualified, but they provide an education within the framework of their stipulated syllabus only," says Man Mohan Kalyani, project leader for the Bikaner club. "This does not include many things that are needed for the overall development of the students. So we set about supporting both teachers and students with these additional skills."

The global grant will provide desks for 1,685 students. The training will target 240 teachers. In addition to instruction in basic subjects, the curriculum aims to improve students' self-confidence, communication skills, leadership skills, and personality development. The clubs expect the program will have even better results than the earlier shipment of desks, which helped improve grades by 23 percent in the four recipient schools. Those results alone led regional authorities to select two of the schools as sites for annual examinations, meaning local students did not have to travel 15 miles to another city to take the exam.

Cornelia Stockman, a member of the Maine club, traveled to Bikaner early in the grant planning process. She said she was impressed by the level of commitment and professionalism displayed by the School Management Committees.

Stockman said local families who can afford it send their children to private schools with classrooms and desks. By contrast, students at the governmentowned schools sit on the ground in an open area surrounded by security walls and gates. There is no compulsory attendance beyond sixth grade. The local education experts insist the students are more likely to stay in school if they have a desk to sit at, Stockman says.

Mehta is thankful the grant was able to help his native country.

"I thought it would be great if we could do something with a region that I had ties to," Mehta says. "And good education is fundamental to the quality of life."

Stockman said even though the process of expanding the project's scope was not without bumps, the Bikaner community responded to every need as the grant application evolved.

"We had to go back to them three or four times, but every time we asked them to do something else, they did it," she recalls. "They never gave up, and did everything necessary to meet the requirements of the global grant."

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
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Rotary Historic Moments

Since Boys' Week, Rotary Has Been Empowering Young Leaders



The Rotary Club of Fort Smith, Arkansas, USA, sponsored a float in a 1924 Loyalty Day parade.

The history of Rotary's work with youth dates back to the 1920s, when many clubs took part in an international event known as Boys' Week.

The first Boys' Week was held in New York City in May 1920 by the Rotary Club of New York and other local organizations. The event was part of an effort to promote youth development in the areas of education, citizenship, health and hygiene, and vocation.

New York club members reported on the success of Boys' Week at the 1920 Rotary convention, hoping that it would become part of the Boys' Work program, which Rotary had established several years earlier with the creation of the Committee on Work among the Boys (later known as the Boys' Work Committee). The program encouraged Rotary clubs to work with other community initiatives and organizations to counter juvenile delinquency, truancy, and poor physical health, with the goal of developing good citizens.

Boys' Week events quickly spread throughout the world. By the mid-1920s, they were being held in almost 600 locations across 25 countries. In 1928, the number of participating cities and towns had grown to about 3,000.

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Rotary Historic Moments

The target audience also grew rapidly. Girls rode on the float sponsored by the Rotary Club of Vicksburg, Mississippi, in a 1924 Loyalty Day parade held in conjunction with Boys' Week.

By the late 1920s, the United States had established a National Boys' Week Committee, in which Rotary participated. Rotary clubs were encouraged to support their local Boys' Week events as a way to achieve the goals of the Boys' Work program.


In 1934, Boys' Week became known as Youth Week, and in 1936, Boys and Girls' Week.

The RI Board of Directors voted to discontinue Rotary's official sponsorship of Boys and Girls' Week in 1956 in order to support new youth efforts, but it encouraged clubs to continue participating in local youth service initiatives.

Rotary went on to create other programs for young people in the following decades, including Interact, Rotaract, and Rotary Youth Exchange.

In 2010, Youth Service became Rotary's fifth Avenue of Service. Rotarians recognize the positive change that young people implement through leadership development activities, community and international service projects, and exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural under-

standing.

How to cook Strawberry Pianono

Strawberry Jelly Rolls Recipe is one of the most loved desserts which are famously known here in the Philippines as "Pianono". This enticing sweet treat is made of light sponge cake rolled with a tangy strawberry filling that makes an excellent crowd-pleaser dessert after a hearty meal.

Making this Strawberry Pianono Recipe is simple and quite easy to do, just make sure that the sponge cake is still warm when you put the strawberry filling to avoid it from breaking or cracking. Aside from strawberry, you may also try some other fillings in preparing jelly rolls; there are lots of jams and preserves to choose from.

Jelly Roll Cake Ingredients:

- 5 eggs, separated at room temp.
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- ½ tsp. salt
- 3 tbsp. melted butter
- Icing sugar for dusting
- ¹/₂ cup strawberry or rasp-

Cooking Procedure:

- Preheat an oven to 350F. Line a 15×10 inch jelly roll pan with parchment paper. Place egg yolks in a bowl and beat until doubled in size add in ¾ cup of sugar gradually, and beat well and set aside. In another bowl whip egg whites until soft peaks then add the remaining ¼ cup of sugar and continue to beat until medium peaks formed. On a third bowl or a parchment paper sift together, flour, baking powder, and salt.
- Add half of flour mixture into egg batter and fold in. Add half of whipped egg whites and fold in. Repeat with the remaining half and half, and lastly fold in melted butter. Pour in the batter and spread evenly on a prepared pan. Bake in a preheated oven for about 15 minutes or until the cake springs back when gently pressed. Cool in a wire rack for a couple minutes and dust with icing sugar completely.
- Invert jelly roll cake on a well dusted and clean towel or parchment paper with icing sugar to prevent from sticking. Peel off the parchment paper, and roll the cake with cloth and let it rest for 3 minutes. Unroll the cake and spread jam thinly and evenly, then re-roll the cake back again. Cut both ends of jelly roll, then cover and store at room temperature until ready, slice and serve.

Tips : The key to jelly roll success is to roll up the cake while its warm and flexible, so it won't crack when filled.

Once you master the rolled cake it's easy as 1...2...3.., you can put any fillings you like and add any frosting to cover the rolls.


