President's Message

This does not seem like a time for great optimism, but it has to be. Long before Rotary was founded, the world dealt with great crises that tested humankind's ability to progress and endure. In the age of Rotary, the world has faced many more catastrophes; however, we have survived, and every step of the way, Rotary has helped the world heal.

Every great challenge is an opportunity for renewal and growth. I

revealed the theme of Rotary Opens Opportunities at the International Assembly in San Diego just as the COVID-19 crisis was beginning, but these are words that I have believed for many years.

Rotary is not just a club that you join; it is an invitation to endless opportunities. We believe in creating opportunities for others and for ourselves. We believe that our acts of service, large and small, generate opportunities for people who need our help, and that Rotary opens opportunities for us to live a richer, more meaningful life, with friends around the world, based on our core values.

3 principles we use to beat the pandemic By Joe Otin, governor of Rotary District 9212



If ever in our lifetime there was a defining moment of earth-shattering proportions – this is it. The generation before us lived through World War II which universally altered the course of our destiny. From time immemorial our predecessors have faced seismic economic collapses, devastating armed

conflict, climatic catastrophes, and other traumatic incidences that have led to desperation, death and destruction.

These developments in turn have forced us to remodel personal behavior, restructure established institutions, and generally change our way of life.

The attack on humanity by the coronavirus is monumental. From the initial outbreak in China to today, the world has been jolted into action because the initial strides taken by governments to stop the spread of COVID-19 across the globe fell short, as the statistics have come to show. Here in East Africa, our governments took unprecedented action, closing borders, grounding national carriers, and suspending public meetings with the intention to halt its advance.

What distinguishes defining moments in our history is not the nature of the crisis, but rather the quality of the decisions that we make. In the wake of the drastic measures taken by our political leaders to address the outbreak we, as Rotary, have had our own decisions to make. These decisions are guided by three simple principles.

The first one is that individual action has the greatest bearing on the disease, and this includes personal hygiene, social distancing, and other guidelines outlined by the World Health Organization. We must all take individual responsibility to stop the spread of coronavirus.



The second is to support the government in its initiatives to flatten the curve as indeed it is the concerted effort by the private sector, public institutions, development organizations, and society as a whole that will stop this threat.

Thirdly, it is in sharing messages of hope and reminding people that together we will prevail, and that the disruption in our lives is not only momentary but it is also a crucial part of continuity.



In District 9212, we have canceled our district conference and instructed all Rotarians to suspend physical meetings. Without missing a beat, they have adopted wholeheartedly to virtual meetings on popular video conferencing platforms. The executive committee has set up a response team to support national administrations in Kenya, Ethiopia, and South Sudan, and past governor Dr. Geeta Manek has raised more than \$20,000 in Kenya and Ethiopia.

The embodiment of Rotary clubs and their ultimate purpose is to embrace and support communities in need, and thus the world needs Rotary more now than ever before. Never in our lifetime has humanity been better equipped to crush a threat to our wellbeing of these dimensions. We have the technology to track it, the science to beat it, the media to coordinate our united action, and the heart to fight back.

It is through our determination and commitment that we give hope and healing to the world.

Centro joins Brigada Eskwela under the New Normal

This year's Brigada Eskwela is entirely different as compared to prior years. Brigada Eskwela deviated from the traditional concept of physical cleaning, painting, repainting, and doing minor repairs in schools and instead prioritized preparations and strengthening partnership engagement to ensure that quality basic education will continue despite the challenges posed by COVID-19.

When DepED announced the start of enrollment on June 1 and start of classes on August 24, faculty and staff of Put ing Kahoy Elementary School is problematic on how they will reproduce the modules for their 600 elementary students- > 600 pupils x 8 modules x 24 pages per module x 5 days a week, that is a whopping half a million sheets they have to reproduce per week (assuming that the students choose modular learning instead of online classes).

This is when they tapped the assistance of the Rotary Club of Sta Rosa Centro for assistance. The club heeded their call and provided them with one photocopier to assist them with reproducing the modules.

Handwashing Facility for Science and Technology High School

Hand hygiene at school and within our communities plays an essential role in helping to reduce the spread of infectious diseases.

The WASH in Schools initiative of Rotary International was created to motivate Rotary clubs to develop sustainable water, sanitation, hygiene (collectively referred to as WASH) and the Rotary Club of Sta Rosa Centro heeded this call. And so a hand washing facility was made at Santa Rosa Science and Technology High School, home of RC Sta Rosa Centro's Interact Club. There may be no face-to-face classes at this time but this facility will definitely be an asset come January.

June 27, 2020 - "District 3820 - District Training Assembly: Transforming Rotary Clubs to the New Normal"



WHY THE ROTARY YEAR BEGINS 1 JULY

Ever wonder why the Rotary year begins 1 July? The international convention initially played a key role in determining the start date of our fiscal and administrative year.

Rotary's first fiscal year began the day after the first convention ended, on 18 August 1910. The 1911-12 fiscal year also related to the convention, beginning with the first day of the 1911 convention on 21 August.

At its August 1912 meeting, the Board of Directors ordered an audit of the International Association of Rotary Clubs' finances. The auditors recommended that the organization end its fiscal year on 30 June to give the secretary and treasurer time to prepare a financial statement for the convention and board, and determine the proper number of club delegates to the convention. The executive committee concurred, and at its April 1913 meeting, designated 30 June as the end of the fiscal year.



Rotary's first fiscal year began the day after the first convention ended. The convention of the Rotary Clubs of America was held in Rotary's birthplace, Chicago, in 1910.





The COVID-19 virus is transmissible via droplets, which are expelled when an infected person coughs or sneezes. It can also be transmitted when a person comes into contact with an infected surface. The lifespan of the virus varies on the kind of surface, but it typically last for a few hours to 5 days. Currently, there is no information which states the virus is airborne, unlike chicken pox.

How to protect your worksite?

Personal Protection and Hygiene

- . Thoroughly wash hands with soap and water for 20 seconds
- Use alcohol-based hand sanitizers (atleast 60% ethanol or isopranol) Cough and sneeze into shirt or sleeve, if tissue is not available
- · Avoid touching the face (i.e. nose, mouth and eyes)

Note: The use of face masks is only recommended for those who are sick, caring for the sick, and health care professionals



Social Distancing Measures

- · If possible, maintain a distance of 1 meter from other people
- Offer telecommuting (e.g Skype, Viber) instead of in-person meetings
 Postpone mass gatherings until further notice
- · Avoid shaking hands with clients or colleagues
- Avoid people with flu-like symptoms

Environmental Measures

- · Clean frequently touched surfaces and objects (e.g. doorknobs,
- tables, handles, phones, laptops) Sanitize comfort rooms
- · Maintain the cleanliness of public spaces
- · Provide alcohol-based dispensers in public areas

Management of Symptomatics

- An employee exhibiting symptoms (i.e. fever, coughing and sneezing) should be provided a face mask
- He/she should then be isolated and seek appropriate medical care
 Safety officers should be responsible for reporting
- symptomatic/asymptomatic cases

 The work area should be properly decontaminated



Lockdown Options of Offices/Project Sites

Any decision should be upon coordination with DOLE, and DOH including duly authorized representative of client or building administration.
