Making the most of what we have

"Kung maiksi ang kumot, matutong mamaluktot". An old Tagalog saying that is so applicable in this time of pandemic.

I am one of those people who plan ahead. When I felt that a lock-down is imminent, I have already gone to the supermarket ahead of the others and bought supplies to last us for at least 2 weeks, and hopefully for a month. I was thankful that I, nor my husband, did not need to queue to the grocery and be exposed to other people.

Planning the meals was a challenge as we need to scrimp. Even if you have the money to buy, getting the supplies would still be difficult. Delivery systems during the first few weeks was not yet in place. The mobile palengke did work a bit but again, they only have the basics and the supplies are limited.

And because supplies are scarce, I was able to dig deep into my pantry. Items that would probably have been left to expire in normal circumstances was put to good use. I searched for recipes that would only require the limited items that I have. It worked well as I have learned new dishes to serve. I have learned too that small servings worked better as compared to cooking one big batch and reheating.

Even our face masks were handmade. I searched how to make D-I-Y masks and prepared several for us.

The restrictions may not be as strict now as it was during ECQ (Enhanced Community Quarantine) but one thing is sure, we have learned to value what we have better.

Jennifer E. Jones makes history, becomes first woman named Rotary president-nominee



Jennifer E. Jones, a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, Canada, has been nominated to become Rotary International's president for 2022-23, a groundbreaking selection that will make her the first woman to hold that office in the organization's 115-year history.

Jones will officially become president-nominee on 1 October if no other candidates challenge her.

Jones says she sees Rotary's Ac-

tion Plan as a catalyst for increasing Rotary's impact.

"As we reflect upon our new strategic priorities, we could have never envisioned that our ability to adapt would become our North Star during what is inarguably the most profound time in recent history," Jones said in her vision statement. "Silver linings rise out of the most challenging circumstances. Using metric-driven goals, I will harness this historic landscape to innovate, educate, and communicate opportunities that reflect today's reality."

As the first woman to be nominated to be president, Jones understands how important it is to follow through on Rotary's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Statement. "I believe that diversity, equity, and inclusion ... begins at the top and for us to realize growth in female membership and members under the age of forty — these demographics need to see their own reflection in leadership," Jones said. "I will champion double-digit growth in both categories while never losing sight of our entire family."

President's Message August 2020

The year 2020 has brought monumental changes that have already included a global pandemic and a renewed call for social justice. We are reminded that we live in a constantly changing world, and Rotary is a reflection of that world.

We must be ready to listen and adapt, always drawing upon our core values of service, fellowship, diversity, integrity, and leadership. If we live these values and apply The Four-Way Test to all aspects of our lives, we will be prepared to lead at all

times.

I am proud of how we have proven our ability to adapt. Faced with a pandemic, Rotary has not stopped. We moved meetings online and found new ways to serve. We turned the canceled 2020 Rotary International Convention in Honolulu into our first virtual convention. Each week, we are proving that Rotary is a flexible gathering that happens anywhere — in traditional meetings, on cellphones, and on computers. Rotary offers a way to connect for everyone who wants to, at any time, and will continue to do so.

Some have even told me that they enjoy Rotary's mix of online and in-person meetings more now than before! How can we build on this momentum and seize the opportunity to embrace change so that Rotary keeps thriving?

For me, supporting new types of clubs is key. They are no longer just experiments but a real part of Rotary today. Making a difference doesn't need to be complicated





July 15, 2020





DISTRICT GOVERNOR'S TIME (District Governor Ray Atienza)

Past President Carol Salvahan introduced DG Ray Atienza.

District Governor Ray Atienza greeted the officers and members of the club. He emphasized that even though we are going through this pandemic, he is still expecting that more clubs will continue and create new projects and he believes that Rotary Club of Sta. Rosa Centro is one of those. With regards to membership, a club should have a 100% retention rate, two additional new members, and, if possible, should sponsor a new club. He also encouraged the club to maintain Rotaract and Interact clubs as well as the Rotary Community Corp (RCC) to uplift the livelihood of people in Sta.Rosa. As for the Service Projects, he reminded the club that it should be aligned with the Areas of Focus by the district which is Environment. He assured that before the end of RY 2020-21 the club will produce more projects especially the Mayor of Sta. Rosa is a member of the club. He also discussed the legacy project of the district - "Adopt-A-Day Care Project". He requested the club to adopt a day care center to continue giving the opportunity to marginalized children. He envisioned that after the pandemic the children will be able go back to school and this day care center will serve as a preparation when that time comes. He also aims to distribute face masks to all the children in District 3820 starting in Laguna. He acknowledged the participation of the club in urban vegetable gardening and said that it is a good project because it provides some of the food necessities at home and helps boost the immune system through a greener surrounding.

He then requested the participation of the club in the upcoming event for the youth, RYLA. He also requested a Covid related joint project of all clubs in Santa Rosa. He encouraged the club to participate in International Convention in Taipei since the Zone Institute is already cancelled. For public image, he requested to rehabilitate the previous Rotary year markers or have a billboard of the club. For the Rotary Foundation, he asked the club to patronize the products for the End Polio Campaign. As for the District Grant, Adopt a Daycare Center, he added that the club can just submit an application to Chairman Lirio to receive funds for its execution. He also announced that the Global Grant is already approved in the amount of US\$5,000 and just needed to be coordinated with Chair Noel Alidio for the submission of all the necessary documents.

He encouraged the members to continue in service in Rotary despite the challenges in the new normal. Adjournment:








The Classification Principle of Rotary

Virtually all membership in Rotary is based upon a "classification." Basically a classification describes the distinct and recognized business or professional service that the Rotarian renders to society. The principle of Rotary classification is somewhat more specific and precise. In determining the classification of a Rotarian it is necessary to look at the "principal or recognized business or professional activity of the firm, company or institution" with which an active member is connected or "that which covers his principal and recognized business or professional activity."

It should be clearly understood that classifications are determined by activities or services to society rather than by the position held by a particular individual. In other words, if a person is the president of a bank, he or she is not classified as "bank president" but under the classification "banking."
