The Rotary Foundation approves changes to funding model, set to take effect 1 July 2021

To better support the growth of global grants, The Rotary Foundation Trustees recently approved policy changes to help balance financial resources with program demands. These changes will take effect 1 July 2021.

The global grants program has been a tremendous success since it launched in 2013-14. That first year, the Foundation awarded 868 global grants worth \$47.3 million. By 2019-20, the number of global grants awarded increased to 1,359, worth \$95.6 million. While global grant funding increased by more than 100%, contributions to the Annual Fund, which is the primary source for global grant funding, did not keep pace. The demand for global grant funding is far greater than what is available.

Moreover, the Foundation responded to the unprecedented challenges brought on by COVID-19 by awarding \$32 million in disaster response grants since March 2020 to projects aimed at fighting the pandemic.

The amount available from the World Fund for global grants each year depends primarily on Annual Fund contributions. Over the last several years, the World Fund, which provides the necessary funding for our highest priority activities, has been depleted before each Rotary year ends, leaving many grant proposals unfunded. This year, the Foundation implemented several cost-saving measures in an effort to increase the funding available for global grants. The Trustees and the RI Board also transferred \$15 million from the Foundation's operating reserves and RI's budget surplus to the World Fund. In total, nearly \$20 million in additional funding is being made available this year. Unfortunately, it's still not enough to meet demand. Trustees expect a financial shortfall this year and in years to come due to the growing success of the global grant program.

Therefore, in an effort to fund more global grants, these policy changes will take effect 1 July:

- District Designated Fund (DDF) contributions transferred to PolioPlus will be matched at 50% instead of 100% by the World Fund before being matched by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. The Gates Foundation will continue matching 2-to -1 every dollar that Rotary commits to polio eradication, up to \$50 million per year.
- 2. The World Fund match of DDF will be reduced from 100% to 80% when being used for global grants. For 2020-21, as long as funds remain available, DDF will continue to be matched at 100% as long as applications are submitted by 31 May and approved by 30 June. Applications that are not approved this Rotary year will need to be resubmitted with adjusted financing.
- 3. Five percent of the current year's Annual Fund-SHARE contributions will be take equally from the World Fund and DDF to help fund operating expenses. Currently, a \$100 Annual Fund-SHARE contribution is divided as \$50 for DDF, \$45 for the World Fund, and \$5 for operating expenses. Starting 1 July 2021, a \$100 contribution will be divided \$47.50 to DDF, \$47.50 to the World Fund, and \$5 to operating expenses. As shown by the Foundation's reviews from several independent charity ratings, our stewardship of contributions has made The Rotary Foundation one of the most highly rated and effective nonprofits. We received a four-star rating from Charity Navigator for 13 straight years.
- 4. The ability to roll over unused DDF will be limited to five years. Districts are encouraged to fully use their DDF to make a positive impact through our programs, but the amount of DDF rollover remains high on 1 July 2020, \$48.8 million was carried into the current Rotary year. At the end of each Rotary year, starting 1 July 2026, DDF that has been held for more than five years will be applied at the district's discretion to PolioPlus, areas of focus Endowment funds, Rotary Peace Centers, the Endowment Fund, the Disaster Response Fund, or the World Fund.

Rotarians pledge to restore the monarch butterfly's disappearing habitat

As 2015-16 governor, Marlene Gargulak visited all 63 clubs in her district, speaking at each one about the pollinator crisis and asking them to sign on to a "pollinator pledge" to take action. She sent letters to the governors of all 74 districts across the



eastern monarch's territory asking them to do the same thing. The District 5960 conference that year included a sale of pollinator plants. In July 2015, Gargulak attended a meeting with former U.S. Vice President Walter Mondale, a resident of Minnesota, at which they discussed ways to increase pollinator habitat. The next month, she and Stillwater Rotarians Craig Leiser and Bev Driscoll met with U.S. Representative Betty McCollum of Minnesota to kick off Operation Pollination, a broad effort open to anyone interested in increasing pollinator habitat. The Rotarians also helped form the St. Croix Valley Pollinator Partnership, which brought together small-business owners; a baseball team; government agencies such as the National Park Service, Forest Service, and Fish and Wildlife Service; and private companies, including Andersen Corp. and Xcel Energy. In 2016, the partnership received a grant of \$200,000 from the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, allowing it to restore native habitat on nearly 1,000 acres of land and establish a 5-acre seed plot for milkweed and wildflowers at the St. Croix Correctional Center.

KPAP - Katutubong Gulay: Paramihin, Anihin, Pagkain natin ito

KPAP is the club's banner project for the year.

To urge residents to produce their own food , the club launched the project " KPAP - Katutubong Gulay: Paramihin, Anihin, Pagkain natin ito" , a backyard gardening contest for Barangay Langkiwa. The main objective of the program is the establishment of urban gardens or backyard farms in the barangay to promote organic food production among the marginalized sector of the population in order to achieve a degree of food security.

Update as of November 14, 2020

* 2nd virtual meeting was held by KPAP Monitoring Team to get updates on how the families are progressing especially after the onslaught of Typhoon Ulysees. Aside from teaching them how to plant, the group also taught the families how to become disaster resilient.





Presidential Citation

To be eligible for the Rotary Citation, clubs need to begin the year as active clubs in good standing – or having paid each invoice balance in full upon receipt.

Club must have an outstanding balance of \$0.00. Invoices are due when they are posted, in mid-January and mid-July.

Rotary club leaders can go into Rotary Club Central and select at least 13 out of 25 goals they wish to apply toward citation achievement. This flexibility allows clubs to choose the goals that are most relevant and achievable. In addition, many goals will be self-reported by marking "achieved" in Rotary Club Central.



ROTARY HISTORY

The start of Rotary in South America

Rotary extended its reach to South America when the Rotary Club of Montevideo, Uruguay, was chartered on 1 February 1919.

Rotarians had been interested in expanding to South America as early as 1916, and had focused on Argentina, Brazil, and Chile. But the first club was instead chartered in Uruguay, thanks to the efforts of Herbert P. Coates.

Coates, a native of England, had lived in South America for many years.

He became acquainted with Rotary while on a business trip to Cincinnati, Ohio, USA, in 1916. He found that many businessmen in the city were busy with the Rotary Convention taking place there. Intrigued, he arranged to visit Rotary headquarters and asked about starting a club in Uruguay.

Coates returned to Montevideo with approval to start a club, and his work led to an organizational meeting in July 1918. That December, he and 21 other charter members submitted the club's formal application to Rotary.

Coates later helped start a club in Buenos Aires, Argentina, and served as a special commissioner for expanding Rotary in South America.

Rotary founder Paul Harris described Coates as instrumental in spreading Rotary to and throughout the continent. Rotarians there agreed and referred to Coates, whom they called Don Heriberto, as the "Father of Rotary in South America."

Interesting Facts You Might Not Know About Batanes

Batanes is on every Filipino's bucket list. And did I mention it's also every photographer's dream destination? With its picturesque hills and jawdropping beaches, no one has to wonder why.



Batanes is actually a group of

10 volcanic islands, three of which are inhabited, namely Batan (where the provincial capital of Basco is located), Itbayat, and Sabtang.

Separation of these islands paved the way for the formation of two distinct dialects of the Ivatan language. Those who live in the islands of Batan and Sabtang mainly speak Ivatan while those in Itbayat speak the Itbayat dialect.

In accordance with legislation passed on November 28, 1988, the following are the approved provincial symbols of Batanes:

Provincial Tree: Aryus

Provincial Flower: Rahakut (native white orchid) Provincial Bird: Aradiwangan, Voyit (Ivatan dove)

Provincial Fish: Mayasang

Provincial Air Plant: Humahum (fern)
